USDA APHIS WS is awarding \$500,000 through Cooperative Agreements to nine Federally recognized Native American Tribal governments to combat CWD on Tribal lands across ten different states. These projects will allow recipients to further develop and implement CWD management, response, and research activities in wild cervids, including surveillance and testing on Tribal lands.
